

Investigate 3G concerns

Reports linking 3G pitches and their rubber crumb with cancer is something which has caused significant concern.

Studies have suggested that rubber crumb has been found to contain potentially damaging elements including arsenic, chromium and lead. A former NHS Manager has also revealed that his goalkeeper son had contracted Hodgkin's Lymphoma and expressed concern that there may have been a connection with his diving on a 3G pitch and his ingesting rubber crumb.

It goes without saying that more testing must be carried out. If, as we all hope, the results prove that there is no link between, it will allow local authorities and football clubs to continue to install pitches which allow the all year round participation, without the threat of a class action.

It will also allow those people who maintain the pitches to do so without any nagging doubts in the backs of their minds that they may be storing up health problems and free up parents to watch their offspring slide into tackles and produce full length goal saving dives without worrying about any potential long term consequences.

The technology is still relatively new and, while I may be wrong, I suspect that improving the playability of the surfaces was the primary concern of developers. Health issues, outside of the potential for burns, strains and sprains, had no reason to even be on their radar.

When I was a kid my first pet was a rabbit called Bilbo Baggins. He died and we got a second who I also called Bilbo Baggins, but he too died before reaching what a rabbit would consider to be ripe old age. We'd built what we thought was a fantastic hutch for Bilbo 1 and Bilbo 2 but it was only a few years later that we put two and two together. The hutch had been built out of asbestos...

It is now vital that proper testing is carried out, even if only to ensure that we are not inadvertently producing the sports pitch equivalent of asbestos rabbit hutches.

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New mowers for St George's Park



Alan Ferguson, Group Head of Grounds and Estates at St George's Park, home for England's 24 national teams, needs little or no introduction. The former Ipswich Head Groundsman is responsible for all 12 pitches at the 330-acre National Football Centre in the Staffordshire countryside, as well as the wider estate.

His remit also includes over-seeing the playing surface at Wembley Stadium. That represents a lot of 'cleaning' to be done after games and training, Alan had watched carefully the development of the Allett RM34 Stadium Mower as a potential solution to the centre's pitch cleaning problems.

"We had a trial with a demonstration machine on loan in August to September 2015 and were immediately impressed with the way the Allett performed," explained Alan.

"With the extra width - 34" - the roller and vacuum effect, it saves an immense amount of time and manpower in the clean-up process after matches. In fact we were so delighted with the Allett we ordered seven machines and took delivery in December. They really are the ideal solution and are in use on all the pitches."

Specifically developed with and for stadium groundsmen, the Allett RM34 has a twin-bladed high-lift system that cuts and vacuums quickly and efficiently to clean up after matches or mow higher during grow-in. There's a micro height adjustment between 15mm and 75mm for exact blade cut and a 5 gear speed selection for precise control. Solid and substantial to use the RM 34 is surprisingly light and also has an optional front fixed brush strip available.

The primary role for the Allett machines at St. George's Park is to cut and remove the loose grass on the surface of the pitch which, if left to break down and decay, forms algae on the surface which is not only slippery but leaves the pitch open to risk of fungal attack, disease and a build up of thatch.

"There's the 'golden hour' after training or a game to clear this debris, and that is where the Allett RM 34 is so fast and effective, substantially cutting the time we used to spend getting the pitches back into shape," said Alan.

As well as the work done at St. George's Park, Alan's team will be relocating three of the Allett RM34 mowers to the training base in France as part of the national side's maintenance support on the training pitches for the European Championships in 2016.

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The sturdy RTV has been loaned to Thames Valley Police to allow the force to patrol miles of countryside and protect farms and local businesses from being targeted by criminals.

Thames Valley Police is the first police force in the UK to introduce an all-terrain vehicle to its fleet and the impact is already showing after six months, with the force seeing crime rates fall rapidly thanks to the constant presence of police officers being able to access areas of land that were previously out of bounds or difficult to access.

Two residents who have experienced the RTV's benefits first hand are Colin and Pauline Rouse, residents of Backhouse Farm in Bampton. The couple had previously been victims of an arson attack when bales in their field were set alight, causing huge devastation and a significant loss of income.

The use of the RTV by the force meant that when a second arson attack took place, Police Community Support Officer, Colin Davies, was able



to get to the scene of the crime within minutes before heavy rainfall washed away incriminating evidence.

"The RTV has been invaluable in helping us reach a much higher percentage of rural crimes and improve the service we provide to the local community, such as the arson attack at Backhouse Farm.

"Local farmers have recognised what we can now do and have been fantastic in supporting us, providing access to their land so that when an incident takes place, we can be patrolling the difficult countryside terrain in rapid time," said Colin.

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In addition to being used to patrol the countryside, the utility vehicle has been put to good use in the town centre proving its versatility.

The force has attended around 96 crimes across Carterton, Bampton and Norton since the RTV arrived in June last year, with each officer able to get to the scene in under one hour.

There is a strong link with the nearby Waldringfield Golf Club, whose Course Manager provides consultative support through a weekly visit in the summer. During the winter months, the retired Course Manager from Woodbridge Golf Club provides monthly advice. Support is also provided, on an as needed basis, from Ipswich Golf Club greens staff.

"There is clear evidence of steady continual improvement of all aspects of the facilities environmental performance over the nine years since initial certification of the site, and especially with regard to ecosystems, energy and resources, environmental quality, and people and communities. The level of commitment shown by the company, and their staff, is exemplary."

The unique three-hole golf course was the brainchild of David Withers, then Managing Director at Ransomes Jacobsen and now President of parent company, Jacobsen.

PROACTIVE

Located on the edge of the Vale of Evesham, Broadway Golf Club is considered one of the best golf clubs in the Cotswolds. Having been at the club for 29 years, and Head Greenkeeper since 2008, Jamie Blake is on a two-pronged mission to switch the club to a preventative maintenance regime to reduce chemical applications, and improve the overall course condition.

The greens at Broadway are mainly Poa annua and were in the past, susceptible to disease. Although Jamie and his team had made good strides in reducing attacks over the years, they were still managing disease reactively which often meant high chemical usage.

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A few years ago, Jamie attended a talk by Headland Amenity's Mark Hunt who discussed the potential benefits of using Growth Degree Days (or GDDs) as a method of creating a more effective chemical application programme.

"The concept sounded interesting so I went away and started recording data such as rainfall, temperature and disease incidence and compared this with observations of the grass conditions."

In the second year, Jamie was able to use the data to start planning applications of Plant Growth Regulators. "Using the GDD figures and correlated course conditions we worked out that we needed to apply PGR's every 150 days to maximise efficiency. By taking a more scientific approach to applications and working proactively, we have achieved fantastic results."

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Now into the third year of the programme, Jamie is continuing to learn more from the results and is now using the GDD data to plan other maintenance activities such as aeration and topdressing.

This technique has also meant Jamie has achieved his aim of reducing chemical applications.

"I try to minimise using chemicals where I can so when I took over I tried to use none, which didn't work too well!"

As part of his foundation degree Jamie investigated different types of disease management, comparing biological and chemical methods. In the preventative test trials Jamie used Headland's Throttle fungicide.

"I followed the instructions of Headland's Adi Masters to the letter and couldn't believe the results we achieved, it was amazing! We now use Throttle as part of our preventative programme across the course and we are not having to use any other chemicals. Everybody's happy – I'm not having to apply a lot of fungicide and the golfers and members can see the course is kept healthy."

"Being proactive rather than reactive is working well for us and that all comes back to the GDD analysis. If you make observations too late you are only reacting to a problem, but if follow a proactive regime you'll always be in control and ahead of the game." 



The Grand National has that ability to produce everlasting memories in both categories. For me, I recall standing on the terracing of Dens Park, in Dundee, as a 13 year-old, watching the home side play Ayr United and learning that Rag Trade had beaten Red Rum to win the 1976 National thus bringing home my first ever winning bet. I can tell you that the windfall – 10p each way on the 14-1 shot - didn't change me, but also didn't take long to burn a hole in my pocket. Incidentally, while I was jumping up and down proclaiming my insightful punditry, and new found wealth, to my fellow football fans, current Scotland Manager, Gordon Strachan, was putting away a penalty for the home team. Ah the memories!

Moving on just over five years from then and my early days as a cub reporter for The Courier newspaper the first assignment which brought me into contact with a celebrity was the opening of a William Hill bookies in Perth. There I was patting the neck of the aforementioned Red Rum, feeling a tad guilty that I had bet against him those years before and that I had been less than pleased when he'd pipped the gallant Crisp. literally, at the post in 1973.

Despite my early beginnings I'm not a gambler but my wife and I bet on the National every year and had the odd success but nothing more than enough to fund a decent night out. It all goes to highlight just how

vividly the Grand National is woven

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into the culture of this country, and how much of a responsibility sits on the shoulders of those people tasked with ensuring that our favourite horse race is a fantastic spectacle while, at the same time, minimising risk to horse and rider.

The men tasked with ensuring that the Grand National is fit for purpose as one of the most anticipated dates in the calendar are Clerk of the Course, Andrew Tulloch, and Head Groundsman, Mark Aynsley.


Turf Matters caught up with Andrew and Mark for a chat about what it takes to prepare for The Grand National and how to prepare turf for the toughest challenge it can ever face.

Turf Matters You've both got huge jobs which carry a lot of pressure and a responsibility. How do you cope? Andrew Tulloch We are all very passionate about jump racing and the Grand National is a great shop window for the sport. But it also carries a huge responsibility for us to do it well and that also goes for jockeys and trainers and we are all looking to make it as safe as possible. That said it is a horse race and while you can go through scenarios it can't prepare you for everything as there is always something which puts a different twist on it.

It is a live event with a Saturday crowd of 70,000, on live television, with a worldwide audience of over 600 million, and it's not like a football or a rugby match where, if something goes wrong, you can stop play and regroup. Mark Aynsley I like to think Aintree is the best racecourse in the country and more so when the Festival and the National is here. We all go out of our way to make sure everything is as perfect as we can make it. We have a team of eight full time groundsmen and two greenkeepers for the nine hole golf course and a lot of them are from Liverpool and they are proud that they are a part of the National and go that extra mile to TM When does preparation for the National start each year? AT As soon as the race is over we beginning planning for the next one. Our main role is to nurture The National, and from my perspective the welfare of horse and rider is number one priority. The National is a fantastic part of this country's heritage, but we are aware that things need to move forward.

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MA It is a winter sport so ultimately we have to present our best ground, for our biggest event in the year at a time when there hasn't been much grass growth. In maintenance terms we are no different from any other sport, the aim is a healthy sward, at the correct height with the correct organic matter. But more importantly for us and racing is the going for the time of year. We look for well maintained, good to soft ground which keeps the animals at a suitable speed and makes the racing safe.

We currently use Barenbrug Stadium RPR, and have done so for a number of years - one for recovery and two for the holding capacity of the plant in the soil.

If everything is where it should be - in the right place at the right time - our turf surface is ready two weeks in advance. Quite frankly, if you haven't fed it or seeded it, or got the grass to grow two weeks beforehand it's not going to grow. The jobs we do in the immediate lead up are testing starts, ensuring the jumps are ready, that we have spares of everything and the correct number of flags for the race etc.

We rely on an awful lot of help from other people, including Head Groundsmen from other racecourses around the country, and you put your trust in them implicitly. You can't do the job yourself. Funnily enough I tend to worry more after the event than before. I wake up the night after in a cold sweat about what might have gone wrong! AT I've got a couple of excellent Clerks who support me for the National meeting in Simon Claisse, from Cheltenham, and Kirkland Tellwright, from Haydock, and they are both very experienced guys. TM What are your main objectives when it comes to maintaining Aintree? MA We like to have a firmer takeoff and a softer landing area, the reason being the need for a better surface for horses to push off and then something comfier for the horse and jockey to land on. Horses create divots which can be five inches deep and four inches square so really the grass gets obliterated. It is the bends which take most of the damage rather than the areas around the jumps. Footprints on the bends go on an angle of 45 degrees and can be like a plough and furrow at times.



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• For recovery we pre-mix anything up to 250 tonnes of top soil mixed with grass seed and then a treading company provides a team of 45 to go out and individually fill in each divot using buckets and trowels. You don't want any voids in the surface and it is also a way of improving your grass species by getting seed into the turf. AT Mark comes from a golfing background so is used to divots but not quite the sort of divots we have. Four hooves hitting the ground every stride and we have about 100 horses racing each of the three days during the Grand National meeting. We try wherever possible to get everything back within 48 hours with hour back filling, so it is very labour intensive. There is no mechanical way of filling divots. MA We don't manage our turf in a traditional manner because our fixtures are either in the spring or late autumn so in summer time, when other turf professionals might

traditionally be feeding and watering, we really want the grass to go to sleep as we don't want to be cutting it all the time. We are basically forcing the grass for April at times and we do apply nitrogen to get the grass ready. You do have to play with the weather and a warm December helps enormously to get the seed up. We uses fleeces and mulch - Barenbrug BAR 50 is one of the best things every invented. It's fantastic! AT As Mark said we do try to maintain the going on the easy side of good which means you can get a heel in it and make a nice print. There is a direct correlation between injuries and performance. If you and I were to run on tarmac we'd get a bit jarred up and so would a horse, so you are trying to produce the best ground that the majority of horses would like to run on. TM What do you have by way of machinery and, other than Barenbrug who supplies your consumables?

AT We have a very good relationship with John Deere and we lease all of our Wide Area Mowers and tractors from them – Turner Groundcare is the local dealer. The Jockey Club has 14 racecourses and John Deere is the official supplier. We also use a Wiedenmann vertidrain, a Sisis slitters and run hollow corer from Green Tech. MA I use a lot of Headland Xtend products while we also have a group deal with Sherriff Amenity. TM Can you tell me about Aintree's irrigation system? MA We are able to water the running surfaces of all three of our courses and we do this in various ways. The irrigation system has been here 10 years in November. The water comes out of three boreholes into an irrigation ring main. The Mildmay course, which contains hurdles and fences and is part of the National course, uses Briggs Irrigation reels and Briggs booms

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and we run two machines at once in opposite directions - one pulling a 50 metre irrigation boom and the other a 40 metre irrigation boom. In a nine hour watering window we can apply 9 mil of water.

On the National course we have a pop up irrigation system, a Rainbird system installed by Arden Lea, and this has revolutionised our watering. It allows us to water for the "going" and not to mention agronomy reasons. Each fence is served by four sprinklers, two at the front and two at the rear, and all are valve in head and it allows us to target faster areas which require a bit more water or lower lying areas around the Canal Turn which we can omit. The new system also allows me to get to bed a little bit earlier. AT We are the only jump course in the country with a pop up irrigation system which, I might add, came at considerable expense over the last four or five years - the best part of half a million. We are now able to alter the going so Mr Frisk's course record - eight minutes 48 seconds - in 1990, which was set on very quick ground, is likely to stand forever. TM Aintree is famous for its unique fences. Can you tell me how they have evolved over the years? AT My background is surveying and riding horses while Mark is the turf side, coming from a golf background, and the two of us are constantly looking at things and >

It is from this that we came upon the easy fix fences which are basically a plastic mould into which artificial birch is placed and then dressed with natural spruce. Before that they had been of a timber construction and we even have one groundsman, older than the rest of us, who remembers when local farmers grew hedges for transplanting onto the course! But the main thing for us was to make the fences more horse friendly - if a horse does make a mistake and leaves a leg in the fence it still has the opportunity to find its feet again. If you hit something solid at 30mph it's going to hurt so the plastic helps there. We were very keen that the fences retained their outward appearance - that's their uniqueness. The spruce laced into them gives the appearance which is identical to how they have always been. It is important that we don't reduce the height, which is something people do say. What I would say to that is if you are driving down a wiggly road rather than a straight one you concentrate more and

take more care.

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MA The new easy fix fences are contained within a timber frame. At the front you see a 14 inch hard wood toe board along the bottom of the fence, which is painted bright orange, followed by a guard rail which is roughly a third of the way up the and the two act as sighting lines as the horse and jockey approach the fence.

The ground staff all work on fences as I prefer that everyone can do every job. The actual fence building for the National fences does tends to be down to three guys who are very good at it and the outward appearance is superb. I can't do it as well as them, which pains me! TM What other changes have you made to improve safety at Aintree? AT In recent years we have put in by-passing laybys on the outside of the fences. Until recently Aintree was one of the only courses where you couldn't by-pass a fence and if there was a problem the horses still had to jump the fence. The fences were wide enough for this to

happen we put down fibres and and turf and now we can direct runners should there be an obstruction.

Following on from that we have also installed plastic catching pens to catch loose horses. We also have a big team of lads and girls to catch loose horses. These came in in 2009. TM Anything else?

AT Having been involved in the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta one saw what was done to cool down horses after the equestrian events. So following the London Olympics we use the demisting fans which were at Greenwich and have created our own wash down area. We created a dedicated wash down area, provided a tent for shade and utilised the demisting fans which allow the vets to check the horses before they return to the stable. TM Thank you for this insight into what goes on behind the scenes before, during and after our favourite horse race. I hope all goes well this year and we all create wonderful new memories from the 2016 Grand National.

Polaris to the rescue



F.R.E.D. stands for Fast Response Emergency Drone, and it's the name given to a very special service which is operating with a Polaris Ranger 570 Crew in South West Scotland. Holywood Services, the Polaris dealer for the area, has supplied the Ranger to Duncan Carmichael's Community Interest project for the Emergency Services, to carry drones for deployment to 'accident' sites.

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The off-road abilities of the Ranger Crew can take them to otherwise inaccessible areas where the drones are be used for faster search and rescue assessment. Images sent back by the drones are assessed for the emergency services to take appropriate action, effectively saving money, for example, by not having to send the air ambulance to a noncritical scene.

The Ranger 570 Crew was requested as the ideal machine for the job of travelling with the drones, carrying up to four people and having the space for a stretcher mounted on the rear box or for tools and equipment. The ambulance service, para-medics, fire fighters, Police Scotland and national power companies can all benefit from the drones being able to go to road traffic accidents, flooding and searches for missing persons. This is especially effective using the Polaris to carry them into difficult terrain for launch.

Once airborne, special software enables images from the drones to be viewed on up to six devices, such as mobile 'phones and computers, at a time. Search areas and distances covered are far wider with the drones deployed and where there is a need the 4x4 capabilities of the Ranger 570 Crew can take emergency volunteers right to the scene of the accident or disaster zone.

"Successful development of the F.R.E.D. service will, it is hoped, lead to it getting on to the International Rescue Register and we have been showing the Polaris and drones at large numbers of events to demonstrate the recue capabilities, with a great deal of interest as a result," said Duncan Carmichael.



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Inspiring youngsters

Eleven students from Northgate High School in Ipswich visited Ransomes Jacobsen's European Head Office as part of their involvement in the Greenpower IET Formula 24 competition.

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

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Golfing Nobody's Blog

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Well it's about now that the letter informing us of the annual renewal of subs drops onto the mat. Usually we've already been primed as to what to expect – an inflation matching rise or, if there is a special project at the club, a small levy and the promise of a fantastic new irrigation system or stunning new maintenance facilities to house those ridiculously expensive lawn mowers, sprayers and hole making machines

We've also had a chance to justify the expense to our better halves, highlighting that it would be much dearer for a season ticket if we were a football fan, while having bought new clubs last year our capital expenditure would be much less this year.

So spare a thought for our friends at Wentworth who got quite a shock when their subs' letter arrived. Now, even to be a Wentworth member you've done alright for yourself. It is pretty posh and you do get three super golf courses, a plush clubhouse and a top of the range leisure club at your disposal, and if I had the money I'd certainly feel it would be a good way to spend a Saturday morning you might even find yourself up against Bruce Forsyth in the Seniors' Matchplay.

But the new Chinese owners decided to up the annual subs from £8,000 to £16,000. A bit of a choker, particularly if you'd only just persuaded Her Indoors that 8K was fair enough – after all it was significantly less than a grand a month. But, and this was the bit which would have the heart sinking, the club also wanted each existing member to lodge a £100,000 debenture with the club – it's £115,000 for new members.That would be hard to swing, particularly if it meant shelving the special Ruby Wedding celebration holiday to the Maldives and emptying a lump of your pension pot to hand £100,000 over to the already wealthy owner of your golf club.

Now

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Wentworth always has been a little bit removed from any club to which I've been a member but, without thinking about the 100K, let's concentrate on the £16,000 a year. That works out at £1,333 per month. Now if you are a working guy, with a good job capable of swallowing

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a £16,000 per annum golf sub, you will be pretty busy and the chances are that time will be limited through the week. So you might only be able to play at weekends. Build in holidays, weddings, weekend work commitments etc and you may only be able to play three weekends out of four. That means your golf would be costing you around £444 per weekend, or round if you only play one of Saturday or Sunday. Even if you are partnered with Brucie, and walking some of the best manicured fairways to be found anywhere, that does seem quite a bit of money.

I've often attempted the ruse of calculating my membership costs against the number of shots played, which does tend to make most figures look better but I don't think Mrs Golfing Nobody would be taken in by that assessment of the Wentworth subs!


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So I do feel for those Wentworth members. The only consolation is that they do have some wonderful alternative clubs to join in the area and they will find most of them less heavy on the pocket than the subs they were paying even before the price hike.

What it does show is that if you are a member of a proprietary club you are a customer and your ability to influence club policy is limited, whereas if you are a member of a traditional members' club you can decide what the club does. You can get together with a group of fellow like minded members and pass a resolution to ban Ian Poulter style clothes, or limit Societies to Tuesdays from 10am to 11.30am. Or, importantly, hold subs to inflation levels.

Some of those displaced Wentworth members may soon be doing just that on the Boards of the members' clubs they choose to join.
